Importance of Timber

Timber is a natural, renewable, and recyclable resource commonly used for construction or paper products. Timber grown in forests has many benefits for the surrounding ecosystem and economy. The extensive root systems of the forests help reduce sediment runoff into nearby waterways, which also decreases the nutrients entering the water. The water quality is improved by reducing the sediments and nutrients in the water. Additionally, forests remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, so air quality is also improved.

The timber industry is also very beneficial for the economy. It

provides many jobs in multiple stages, from harvesting, manufacturing, and selling. Overall, forest products compromise about 1.5% of the United States economy (U.S. Endowment). The industry encourages landowners to manage their forests rather than cutting them down for other uses, such as development.
